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Warn the righteous man

A righteous man is a man who does right. It is not the will of God that any should perish but God delights in the righteous.

In the olden days, cities were often built on a hill with high walls for protection. They had lookout towers from which watchmen would keep an eye open for danger. If danger approached it was the duty of the watchmen to sound the alarm. When others were sleeping or not being alert the watchmen had to be awake and on the lookout for any danger that threatened the people.

The Church in scripture is figuratively referred to as a city on a hill in which God has placed watchmen. "Again the word of the LORD came unto me, saying, Son of man, speak to the children of thy people, and say unto them, When I bring the sword upon a land, if the people of the land take a man of their coasts, and set him for their watchman: if when he seeth the sword come upon the land, he blow the trumpet, and warn the people; then whosoever heareth the sound of the trumpet, and taketh not warning; if the sword come, and take him away, his blood shall be upon his own head. He heard the sound of the trumpet, and took not warning; his blood shall be upon him.

But he that taketh warning shall deliver his soul. But if the watchman see the sword come, and blow not the trumpet, and the people be not warned; if the sword come, and take any person from among them, he is taken away in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at the watchman's hand. So thou, O son of man, I have set thee a watchman unto the house of Israel; therefore thou shalt hear the word at my mouth, and warn them from me." (Ezekiel 33:1-7)

The duty of the watchman is to watch and to sound the trumpet when there is danger. The scripture did not say "if I bring the sword" but "when I bring the *sword"* implying that danger would come. "When I say unto the wicked, O wicked man, thou shalt surely die; if thou dost not speak to warn the wicked from his way, that wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood will I require at thine hand. Nevertheless, if thou warn the wicked of his way to turn from it; if he do not turn from his way, he shall die in his iniquity; but thou hast delivered thy soul. Therefore, O thou son of man, speak unto the house of Israel; Thus ye speak, saying, If our transgressions and our sins be upon us, and we pine away in them, how should we then live?

Say unto them, As I live, saith the Lord GOD, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but that the wicked turn from his way and live: turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways; for why will ye die, O house of Israel?" (Ezekiel 33:8-11)

Fanny J. Crosby, the songwriter of "Rescue the Perishing" said we must "plead with them earnestly, plead with them gently, He will forgive if they only believe."

The prophet Ezekiel went on to say: "Therefore, thou son of man, say unto the children of thy people, The righteousness of the righteous shall not deliver him in the day of his transgression: as for the wickedness of the wicked, he shall not fall thereby in the day that he turneth from his wickedness; neither shall the righteous be able to live for his righteousness in the day that he sinneth. When I shall say to the righteous, that he shall surely live; if he trust to his own righteousnesses shall not be remembered; but for his iniquity that he hath committed, he shall die for it." (Ezekiel 33:12-13)

God's ways and God's judgements are just. We should not get angry with God when He punishes our loved ones because of their sins or when He does something we are not pleased with. *"He that justifieth the wicked, and he that condemneth the just, even they both are abomination to the LORD."* (Proverbs 17:15)

God is no respecter of persons. King David was described as a man after God's own heart, yet when he sinned God did not turn the other way. David was punished for his transgressions.

Moses spoke to God as a man speaketh with his friend yet when he disobeyed God he was barred from entering the promised land. "Let us therefore fear, lest a promise being left us of entering into his rest, any of you should seem to come short of it." (Hebrews 4:1)

Everyone who is not righteous is classed as wicked - not just those who commit abominable sins. Jesus promises eternal life for the righteous and eternal punishment for the wicked. There is no degree of righteousness or wickedness with God; we are either righteous or wicked. Similarly there will not be different degrees of heaven and hell. There will be one heaven and one hell for all who go there. If we do not make it to heaven we will be going to the same hell as people like Adolf Hitler and Saddam Hussain.

Some people take comfort from the fact that they have never done anything they consider really bad, like murder or adultery. The Bible says in 1 John 5:17 "*all unrighteousness is sin...*" that includes the sins of omission as well as the sins of commission.

As Christians we have to be seen to be on God's side. "And Nadab and Abihu, the sons of Aaron, took either of them his censer, and put fire therein, and put incense thereon, and offered strange fire before the LORD, which he commanded them not. And there went out fire from the LORD, and devoured them, and they died before the LORD. Then Moses said unto Aaron, This is it that the LORD spake, saying, I will be sanctified in them that come nigh me, and before all the people I will be glorified. And Aaron held his peace. And Moses called Mishael and Elzaphan, the sons of Uzziel the uncle of Aaron, and said unto them, Come near, carry your brethren from before the sanctuary out of the camp.

So they went near, and carried them in their coats out of the camp; as Moses had said. And Moses said unto Aaron, and unto Eleazar and unto Ithamar, his sons, Uncover not your heads, neither rend your clothes; lest ye die, and lest wrath come upon all the people: but let your brethren, the whole house of Israel, bewail the burning which the LORD hath kindled. And ye shall not go out from the door of the tabernacle of the congregation, lest ye die: for the anointing oil of the LORD is upon you. And they did according to the word of Moses." (Leviticus 10:1-7)

Aaron's two sons Nadab and Abihu were also priests but they offered strange fire to God and He slew them. It must have been difficult for Aaron who was told not to mourn for them.

Eli was priest in Israel but he failed to reprimand his two sons Hophni and Phinehas with any conviction. Due to this, they went from bad to worse eventually resulting in their deaths and the downfall of Eli and his house.

Lot was a righteous man who **chose** to live in an unrighteous environment. Some people choose to live close to sin thinking that they are strong enough to withstand its attractions and that it will not affect them.

At first we read that: "...Lot dwelt in the cities of the plain, and pitched his tent toward Sodom. But the men of Sodom were wicked and sinners before the LORD exceedingly." (Genesis 13:12-13)

The next time we read, he was in the city of Sodom where he was captured by the enemy. "And they took Lot, Abram's brother's son, who dwelt in Sodom, and his goods, and departed." (Genesis 14:12)

Abraham had to fight to save Lot, yet after he had been delivered he went right back to living in Sodom. Again, Abraham had to intercede for Lot and God had to send angels to warn him and take him out of Sodom before its destruction. Even then, his wife did not make it. Although she came out of Sodom, Sodom did not out of her. Sometimes God delivers us from certain situations and it's not long before we find ourselves in the same position again.

Finally Jesus warned His disciples: "But as the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. For as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered into the ark, and knew not until the flood came, and took them all away; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. Then shall two be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Two women shall be grinding at the mill; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Watch therefore; for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come. But know this, that if the goodman of the house had known in what watch the thief would come, he would have watched, and would not have suffered his house to be broken up. Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." (St. Matthew 24:37-44)

Verses 41 and 42 indicates that they were busy at work, perhaps even doing what they thought was the Lord's work but the admonition is: *"The one shall be taken and the other left."*



Do any of us only ask the Lord to cleanse us when we have committed the so-called 'big sins' (which is an erroneous term because all sin is sin)? If all of us think like this and fail to keep ourselves clean, we may well be emitting that offensive odour to Almighty God!

To live a victorious Christian life and one that will not offend the Lord, we must live clean and be free from all sin. We are so used to hearing this that perhaps it has lost its significance. We must ask God to sanctify us daily – all of us, because we are not immune from the enemy who is working overtime to overthrow us. The consecration prayer is not just for new converts. There is no such thing as being too clean. It would not be too much to ask God to cleanse us each and every time we pray! David asked for a deep cleansing from the Lord in Psalm 51:7 when he said *"Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean: wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow."* David knew exactly where to go when he was sin-stained.

Youth, our theme for this year has been 'Lovers of the Truth'. That means, we hold dear to the truth of the Bible. The Bible does not teach once saved always saved. Handsworth and Long Lane Baptism Friday 13th May 2011

On Friday 13th May 2011, The Church of God in Handsworth and Long Lane held a joint baptismal service. This was held at Beacon Evangelical Church in Handsworth, Birmingham. The service was moderated by Pastor Beverley Anderson. Pastor Frances Prince prayed the opening prayer asking for God's blessings on the event. The scripture reading was taken from St. Matthew 3:13-17.

The night's message was delivered by our National Overseer, Pastor Philip Bennett. He outlined the purpose of baptism emphasising the fact that it did not wash away sins but was the answer of a good conscience towards God (1 Peter 3:21). He showed from the scriptures that Jesus the Son of God though He was sinless submitted Himself to this ordinance. Jesus showed that it was necessary in order for us to fulfil all righteousness. National Ladies Retreat 28th-29th May 2011 Holiday Inn, Great Barr, Birmingham

To describe National Ladies Retreat within the confines of a written article is near impossible. The phrase "you had to be there" springs to mind as this account will simply not do it justice. From the songs, to the teaching, preaching, devotions, testimonies, presentations and fellowship, the event was rich with spiritual food for us to feast on and delight ourselves in. The presence of Almighty God was potent, from the minute we arrived at the venue until the retreat ended on 29th May 2011. Like the feeling after a taste of any good meal, we were left wanting seconds and already excited about next year's retreat.

It was so very clear that the event had been planned in obedience to the Lord's will and that much earnest prayer and seeking had been done beforehand. The theme, *"I'll go, even in the Valley"* was God-inspired. Through this theme, God demonstrated His love and care towards us in a unique way. We learnt how to appreciate our valley experiences rather than to fear them. We were shown the necessity of the various challenges we face and the glory that awaits us all 'on the other side'. All of the attendees, including ministers and pastors, could testify that they learnt something at this retreat and we thank the Holy Ghost for His teaching and His words of comfort.

The retreat began with fire! There was no need to pump anyone to praise the Lord or to sing anyone out of their seat. Our ladies know how to glorify God! Our National Ladies Retreat Co-ordinator - Pastor Beverley Anderson welcomed us all and asked that we keep open minds and view the weekend like a 'spiritual awareness course'. The weekend surely fulfilled its purpose. Many of us testified to each other about the ways in which our eyes had been opened both to spiritual and physical things that are going on around us in our communities.

Following our devotion and worship time, Pastor Anderson facilitated a 'get to know you' icebreaker. We paired up with brethren who we did not know well and asked each other pre-selected questions including; *What's your full name? How long have you been serving the Lord? Is there anything unusual you have done that not many will know about?* Our answers will of course stay between us ladies :o) but suffice it to say this was a lovely exercise that enhanced the all round good feeling that we already had at the start of the retreat.

With the Lord's guidance, I did the introductory presentation on 'The Valley'. I asked the brethren at the start of the presentation to shout out words that are synonymous with the valley experience. The words that were given were predominately negative (isolated, lonely, fearful, steep, dense, depressing, stressful, dark, dry, cold, frightening) with the exception of two which were 'opportunity' and 'glorious'. This is hardly surprising because in the valley it is hard to see the positives.

The aim of the presentation was to get us to change our perspective on the valley experience, and to see it as something that God allows us to go through to teach us something and bring us out on the other side on a higher plain than before. You will usually find a valley between the two highest points on a mountain. Rather than building us a bridge, God will allow us to descend into the valley and we cannot climb our way out without His help! We looked at photographs of different types of valleys including mountain valleys, flat country valleys, plateau valleys, rocky valleys and ravines. Each with their distinctive features, all of them can be related to our spiritual journeys. Let us give glory to God that no matter what type of valley we face there is peace in each one for us because the Lily of the valley is there with us! Following the presentation there was spontaneous worship with ladies crying and speaking in tongues as the Holy Ghost gave utterance.

Throughout the retreat, we enjoyed fiery devotions, during which the Lord reminded us that we are bond-servants, here only to do His bidding and that we have His great commission to fulfil.

During the afternoon session on Saturday 28th May 2011, guest speaker Sister Andrea Reynolds did a superb presentation on "In the Valley with my child". Sister Andrea has been a police officer for over 20 years and she shared her wealth of experience with us, opening our eyes to what is happening with the young people of our communities. Sister Andrea permeated real life cases with scriptural references to our responsibilities.

She tackled difficult topics such as suicide, self harming, gang culture, drug/alcohol abuse, sexual abuse, child murder and mental illness. The subject matter was raw and highly informative. It heightened our awareness about what our young people are facing in this dark and evil world and, what we ought to pray for. We are very grateful to Sister Andrea for allowing God to use her during this difficult presentation. We pray that God will continue to cover her in her indispensable work as a law enforcer in this country.

On Saturday evening, the Browne Sisters blessed us with renditions of *"One Day at a Time"* and *"In the arms of the Sweet Deliverer"*. The latter of the two songs just could not finish!
