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Give Us Of Your Oil For Our Lamps Are Gone Out

In His sermon on the mount, Jesus makes reference to the members of the Church first as salt and next as the light of the world. He then spoke of the Church as a city on a hill: "Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be salted? it is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men. Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on an hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

(St. Matthew 5:13-16)

Salt is classed as a catalyst. This means it changes what it comes into contact with whilst remaining the same. Salt is a precious commodity which gives flavour to food, acts as a preservative and can be used to clean wounds.

We can be members of the Church and yet lose our savour (saltiness). Some take comfort in Church membership and boast about being a member, but we need to make sure our names are written in the Lamb's Book of Life. We can be in the Church and yet not in the kingdom of God. We have to let our lights shine. One song encourages us to let our lights shine as: 'someone down in the valley is trying to come home.' If our light goes out then we are no different from those in the world, even though our names are on the Church register.

In another parable, Jesus referred to the believers as light bearers with a lamp. Sometimes we read the Bible but do not understand some of the analogies which are drawn. Some have grown up with electricity all of their lives, but as a child growing up in Jamaica, I knew what it was like to depend upon a lamp.

The lamp is a vessel which contains fuel in its base. It has a wick where the lower part sits in the fuel and the top part protrudes out of the top. In order for the lamp to function effectively, the owner must take good care of it. He has to ensure that the wick is trimmed and in good condition as well as being in contact with the fuel source. To trim the wick one has to remove the burnt bit, otherwise the wick will smother when lit and give more smoke than light. A wick in good condition when lit will give light to those around and keep people from stumbling in Sometimes, a glass shade is the dark. provided to protect the flame from being blown out by the wind or a draft: "Then shall the kingdom of heaven be likened unto ten virgins, which took their lamps, and went forth to meet the bridegroom. And five of them were wise, and five were foolish. They that were foolish took their lamps, and took no oil with them: But the wise took oil in their vessels with their lamps. While the bridegroom tarried, they all slumbered and *slept.*" (St. Matthew 25:1-5)

We note from the Scriptures (verses 1 and 2) that they were all virgins, but five were wise and five were foolish. From verse 4 we see that they had more than one vessel together with their lamps. In verse 5, the Bridegroom did not come at the expected time but delayed His coming. Some of us have been saved for a long time and probably thought Jesus would have come by now. If we are not careful, we can become careless and fall asleep: "And at midnight there was a cry made, Behold, the bridegroom cometh; go ye out to meet him." (St. Matthew 25:6)

This parable that Jesus used here concerned the Jewish marriage custom. Traditionally, the groom would leave his father's house to find his bride. Once he found her, he would pay a price for her and then return to his father's house to prepare a place for her. After all the preparation was completed, he would return to claim his bride and take her to live with him at his father's house. This would normally be the following year. The bride did not know the exact time of the groom's return, but she knew the season. Whilst the groom was away, the bride-to-be would not just sit idly by awaiting his return.

She would be busy preparing herself and getting everything together for his return. When the groom returned to claim his bride, the event would normally take place at night. He would be accompanied by a procession and someone would go before to sound the alarm that the groom was on his way. On hearing the alarm, the bride and her attendants would quickly grab all their belongings and go to meet the groom.

This parable in reality referred to Christ, the Groom who left heaven to seek his Wife the Church whom He purchased with His own blood. He has been away for over 2,000 years making preparation for her. The Bride (Church) in the mean time needs to be busy getting herself ready for His return: "Then all those virgins arose, and trimmed their lamps. And the foolish said unto the wise, Give us of your oil; for our lamps are gone out." (St. Matthew 25:7-8)

How did they get themselves into such a state? They were not observing the time. They neglected the state of their vessels. They became careless and fell asleep. More importantly, how would we get ourselves into such a state? By neglecting prayer. By neglecting the study of the Word. By missing services and prayer meetings. By neglecting the advice of those over us in the Lord, to name a few things: "But the wise answered, saying, Not so; lest there be not enough for us and you: but go ye rather to them that sell, and buy for yourselves. And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came; and they that were ready went in with him to the marriage: and the door was shut."

(St. Matthew 25:9-10)

Once the door was shut, there was no reopening. As with Noah and the ark, it was God - the Groom's Father who would have commanded the door to be shut: "Afterward came also the other virgins, saying, Lord, Lord, open to us. But he answered and said, Verily I say unto you, I know you not. Watch therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh." (St. Matthew 25:11-13)

All these events are preparing the world for the coming anti-Christ, but we the children of God are encouraged to look up for the return of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

We have a busy year of activities ahead of us and are trusting that God's blessings will be upon each event. Let us work the works of Him that sent us while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work (cited from St. John 9:4).
