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## The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge: but fools despise wisdom and instruction

Fear in this sense is not to dread or be afraid, but rather - to reverence.

**Knowledge:** The facts, feelings or experience known by a person. The state of knowing or the accumulation of facts.

**Wisdom:** *is the correct application of knowledge, understanding, experience, common sense and insight.* 

**Instruction:** The act of giving directions, orders or recommended rules for guidance, use etc.

Some people feel that they are wise and know everything. A wise man however, is not one who feels he knows everything but someone who understands that he does not know everything. None of us are truly wise, so none of us know everything. We can all learn from one another. Those who feel that they know it all will not make it. We must take instruction.

It is said that experience is a hard school to learn at but fools refuse to go to no other. The wise person will learn from the experience of others.

Sometimes, someone who has experienced hardship will advise another - especially someone younger not to go in a certain direction. Often, people feel that they have to experience things for themselves. Some lose their lives in so doing, while others end up with regrets and scars that they carry for the rest of their lives. There are many examples in the Bible showing the consequences for those who refuse to take instruction. Let us go right back to the beginning: "And in process of time it came to pass, that Cain brought of the fruit of the ground an offering unto the LORD. And Abel, he also brought of the firstlings of his flock and of the fat thereof. And the LORD had respect unto Abel and to his offering: But unto Cain and to his offering he had not respect. And Cain was very wroth, and his countenance fell. And the LORD said unto Cain, Why art thou wroth? and why is thy countenance fallen? If thou doest well, shalt thou not be accepted? and if thou doest not well, sin lieth at the door. And unto thee shall be his desire, and *thou shalt rule over him."* (Genesis 4:3-7)

God is no respecter of persons. There must have been a reason why God accepted Abel's offering and rejected Cain's. I believe that Cain did not have any respect, or reverence for the things of God.

In describing His people, God declared: "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me." (St. Matthew 15:8)

Cain had the opportunity to make amendments so that God would be pleased with him, but he failed to take the correction: "And Cain talked with Abel his brother: and it came to pass, when they were in the field, that Cain rose up against Abel his brother, and slew him. And the LORD said unto Cain, Where is Abel thy brother? And he said, I know not: Am I my brother's keeper? And he said, What hast thou done? the voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground. And now art thou cursed from the earth, which hath opened her mouth to receive thy brother's blood from thy hand; When thou tillest the ground, it shall not henceforth yield unto thee her strength; a fugitive and a vagabond shalt thou be in the earth." (Genesis 4:8-12)

This was the consequence of not receiving instructions. God placed a mark on him which he carried for the rest of his life. On top of it all, he lost his communion with God: "And Cain went out from the presence of the LORD, and dwelt in the land of Nod, on the east of Eden." (Genesis 4:16)

After the children of Israel left Egypt, God gave them specific instructions as to how they were to serve Him and conduct His work. It was so important, that half of the book of Exodus - right through to the book of Deuteronomy is dedicated to giving them instructions, yet many of them failed to take heed. Perhaps they thought that some things were not important: "And Nadab and Abihu, the sons of Aaron, took either of them his censer, and put fire therein, and put incense thereon, and offered strange fire before the LORD, which he commanded them not. And there went out fire from the LORD, and devoured them, and they died before the LORD. Then Moses said unto Aaron, This is it that the LORD spake, saying, I will be sanctified in them that come nigh me, and before all the people I will be glorified. And Aaron held his peace. And Moses called Mishael and Elzaphan, the sons of Uzziel the uncle of Aaron, and said unto them, Come near, carry your brethren from before the sanctuary out of the camp. So they went near, and carried them in their coats out of the camp; as Moses had said. And Moses said unto Aaron, and unto Eleazar and unto Ithamar, his sons, Uncover not your heads, neither rend your clothes; lest

ye die, and lest wrath come upon all the people: but let your brethren, the whole house of Israel, bewail the burning which the LORD hath kindled." (Leviticus 10:1-6)

Although they were Aaron's children, he was forbidden from mourning them. Sometimes, people feel that the way we do things is old fashioned and they want to bring things up to date. Someone - not from our Church said to me a while back that they were a 21<sup>st</sup> century Christian and did not want anyone calling them "Sister." I join with the writer of the well-known song that states: '*Give me the old time religion; it's good enough for me.*'

"Now Eli was very old, and heard all that his sons did unto all Israel; and how they lay with the women that assembled at the door of the tabernacle of the congregation. And he said unto them, Why do ye such things? for I hear of your evil dealings by all this people. Nay, my sons; for it is no good report that I hear: make the LORD'S ue people to transgress. If one man sin against another, the judge shall judge him: but if a man sin against the LORD, who shall intreat for him? Notwithstanding they hearkened not unto the voice of their father, because the LORD would slay *them.*" (1 Samuel 2: 22-25)

Eli the High Priest raised his two sons as best as he could, but because they failed to take instructions they were both slain in one day. Right now, we may all be in the Church and going on together, but one day there will be a separation of the wheat and tares: *"He, that being often reproved hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy."* (Proverbs 29:1)

God has given the ministry for our perfection, but we must take heed. We cannot just do as we like without consequences. We do not want to see anyone leave, especially as we are already few in numbers. However only those who are obedient are going to remain in the Church and make it to the end. God has finished not His perfection programme yet: "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish." (Ephesians 5:25-27)

All the wrinkles will be ironed out and all the spots will be blotted out. God help us not to be spots or wrinkles in His House.







## NATIONAL MEN'S RETREAT 2016

Our National Men's Retreat was held on 30<sup>th</sup> September to 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2016. The theme of was **"A Man after God's own Heart."** 

Our first session on Friday commenced with an introduction from the National Men's Retreat Co-ordinator, Brother Justin Clarke. This was followed by a prayer and encouragement from the National Overseer, Brother Philip Bennett.

Brother Jason Prince conducted a workshop on "Answering the Call of God." Areas looked at were:

What is the call of God? How do we recognise the call of God? What can hinder our obedience to the call?

On Saturday, we began with a devotion based on **"Deliverance"** which focused on God delivering the Three Hebrew Children from the fiery furnace, Daniel from the lion's den and Stephen through death.

Brother Stuart Brown did a presentation on the incident between "**David and Bathsheba**." He emphasised that David's downfall was partly due to complacency and referred to 1 Corinthians 10:11-13. David succumbed to the lust of the eyes, but if we do what God has called us to do, He will protect us (Titus 2:11-13).

Brother George Wilson's presentation was on "**David and his Repentance**". He gave us a definition of sin and repentance and then outlined the early training that David went through as a shepherd and his calling by God. He also mentioned some of the hindrances to repentance such as peer pressure and people feeling that they have gone too far in sin for God to forgive them.

Brother Bennett did a presentation entitled **"A Man after Mine own Heart."** He looked at the differences between king Saul and king David. David would always humble himself and depend on God, while Saul was more self-willed, which resulted in his downfall.

On Sunday morning, we had an excellent devotion by Brother Joshua Anderson. We even had Sunday School with Brother Patrick Clarke teaching the lesson.

Before dismissal, each person was asked to say what they would take away with them.

Brother Justin Clarke did an excellent job in putting the retreat together and moderating throughout.

## **National Family Camp 2017**

This year's National Family Camp was held on 20<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2017 at Whitemoor Lakes Leisure Centre. Our theme was '... *for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground*' (Exodus 3:5). Our days were filled with wonderful worship, presentations and leisure activities.

The first presentation was delivered by Brother Justin Clarke, and this was on the heart. Various heart conditions were highlighted, from a spiritual perspective. We learnt it is necessary to work on our hearts and make them presentable to the Lord. This is so He can use us on His programme.

Sister Beverley Wilson led the devotion. The theme was on God's awesomeness. Sister Beverley also testified of the battle her family faced to attend Camp this year. Brother George Wilson preached a sermon and this was entitled *'The Presence of the Lord'*. Two themes were explored; one was how men tend to take things into their own hands, instead of allowing God to work. Examples of Moses killing the Egyptian and Jacob tricking Esau out of his birth-right were used. The other theme was our need to "put off our shoes," likening that to the self-examination we are required to do before God can use us.

On the second day, we enjoyed canoeing on the lake and archery. It was noted that there were some lessons learnt for those rowing on the lake. If we did not work together, we would never reach our destination! All had a great time and we were blessed even further with a presentation from Sister Claudine Brown entitled '*At the burning bush*' (Parts 1 and 2). We examined and discussed the factors of Moses' experience at the burning bush: 1. The location. 2. Vocation, 3. Fire, into the presence of the Lord. 4. Turning aside to see. 5. Shoes. Moses was in the wilderness for a reason, God led him there so that there were no distractions. God did not want anything to take Moses' focus away from Him. The day ended with a worship service led by Brother Justin Clarke. It was a time of prayer and reflection. What is it that we need to take off to enable us to reach Him?

After a keep fit and games session on the third morning, Sister Claudine continued her presentation from the previous day. The group discussed the points as follows: 1. God reveals his plan to man. 2. The call. 3. Excuses, excuses. 4. Signs. 5. Feeling of inadequacy. This session helped us to reflect on ourselves. Do we have any of the characteristics of Moses on his first encounter with God? Do we have a calling and maybe make excuses as to why we cannot fulfil it? Do we say that ...... is better for the task? Isn't ...... more eloquent? Send him/her. Our evening ended with a Camp fire and Bible knowledge quiz.

The teenagers and children also had their own separate sessions based around our theme. The children were able to present sketches of Moses at the burning bush and Moses and Aaron performing miracles.

I'm confident in saying that all attendees enjoyed their time with the Lord and with each other. The National Family Camp was blessed with 6 new campers and I would encourage all our brethren to make plans to attend Camp next year. Total attendance was 53.

## National Family Camp 2017 Testimony

Firstly, I'd like to thank Almighty God that my family and I could attend National Family Camp this year. We have loved attending Camp for the past 7 or 8 years. When the date for Camp 2017 was announced at National Ministers' Convention and it did not coincide with London schools half term date, my heart sank.

I work in a primary school and I know attendance is a necessity during term time - it would be near impossible to get leave for the children, and myself. Also, Rebekah who is currently revising for her GCSEs needed to have 100% attendance. Mock exams are usually scheduled after half term. It would literally take a miracle, but I was still determined not to miss Camp. I began to pray and fast. To attend, it required one week to merge into another. I began to recall the story of Joshua when he told the sun and the moon to stand still and God granted his request (Joshua 10:12-14).

As the months rolled on and Camp arrangements were discussed on the Camp WhatsApp chat, I felt an ache in my heart. I'll mention why, hoping that this will encourage others to attend National Family Camp. When I began to attend Church again, it was at Camp that I really got to know the brethren through discussion in workshops as we shared the Scriptures together. All questions were discussed with honesty and love. The brethren I spoke to were not afraid to share a testimony of their struggles, as they strived to become workers for Christ. For me, a backslider attempting to come back home, this was refreshing and I could not imagine not being with my brethren this year. Proverbs 27:17 says *'iron sharpeneth iron...'* So I took action.

On the first day of term in January 2017, I requested special leave in February 2017. I explained the reason for the time off, but it was declined. There was hope – I was told if I was unhappy with the decision, I could put my request in writing to the school governor. I thanked the Head teacher and left his office, letting him know that I would pray about it. That day, it was confirmed that Rebekah would be sitting mock exams at the time Camp was scheduled.

In the following weeks, Sister Cheryl placed a petition on the Camp chat group for the brethren to fast and pray on our behalf, for our attendance at Camp. This boosted the family. I want to tell you that God who sees our hearts desire is able to answer prayer. Praise His holy name! On Wednesday of that week, George rang Rebekah and Lydia's school, explained that we desired to take them out during term time and asked about the process. I was told that I needed to write, explaining what Camp meant to us and its purpose. It could then be discussed in a meeting on the Friday. We did so and prayed over them.

We had no idea what to expect on the Friday afternoon. When we spoke to the Head of House, the school could not do enough to ensure that our children attended Camp. The fact that the leave was granted was not the main concern. A giant slayed! It was all I prayed for, but God was not finished. The children's 100% record would also be protected - as long as they completed the work they provided. I wondered, did she not realise that Rebekah has mock exams that week? The school stated it was fine. Permission had still been granted for Rebekah and she would not miss her mocks either. They allowed her to complete them at Camp. Can you believe it brethren, how God worked it out?! The trust the school has bestowed upon us - it is only God. I sat in that meeting area and witnessed God in action. I was in awe that all the obstacles evaporated, and the bonus blessings that were added. It's so hard to express in words what it's like to watch God work in front of you. We praised God with tears of joy as we drove away. We haven't stopped praising God and this joy cannot be suppressed. It took three weeks for me to get my answer - right until the very last day of term, but God did it again and my leave was granted. I had to share this testimony with you all to let you know that God still works miracles today.


The theme for Camp was '... for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground' (Exodus 3:5). For me personally, it made me realise that it's okay to come to God as I am, with all my flaws and sin. I learned that God wants all of me rather than bits and pieces. God is aware of all things and He sees all things. By me coming to him with "shoes" on, is me being guarded and trying to hide things from Him. If I am going to the Lord, then I need to be honest and open about who I am.

In Exodus 3, the Bible speaks about God calling Moses at the burning bush. At Camp, I received such a clear message from this chapter, to the point where I had to reflect on my own life and journey. Fire is both hot and bright. A person out in the cold and dark who is freezing and cannot see, would be drawn to that fire in order to keep warm and see what/who is around them. I was that person before I got saved. I was a frozen soul surrounded by nothing but darkness. Through surrendering to Christ, I found that fire. I found the light to see where I was and the next steps to take. That ice for me had turned into a burning fire within my soul. Camp put this into perspective and made me realise the amount of lost, frozen souls that the world has. These souls need saving! It has made me understand and appreciate exactly what Christ has done and is continuing to do for me. I appreciate the guidance from the Holy Ghost in going through all of this and the unconditional love that Father has for me.

The four days at Camp felt like it was just one day; the time flew. I learned so much about myself in those days there and it just made me want more of the Lord. I got to know my brothers and sisters more through the activities we took part in. The daily devotions gave me things to think about – good spiritual food and I was able to just pour out during services. Camp fell at the perfect time for me as part of my journey in growing in Christ and it was something that I really needed to experience. I did not want to leave.

### A wall is:

 A continuous structure that encloses or divides an area of land

## • A thing regarded as a protective or restrictive barrier

A wall can be a good thing - provided it is in the right place. A wall built where it should not be is problematic.

Around the world historically and even now, some cities have walls around them. It was also true in Bible days. They were built for a number of reasons; for defence, protection, privacy, to enclose and to divide people.

The Guardian newspaper ran a special investigation in November 2013 into the walls around the world today. The article stated that "mankind is building separation barriers at a rate perhaps unequalled in history". They found that at least 6000 miles worth of wall (or 'separation barriers') have been built in the last decade alone. Some walls are to block illegal immigrants, some walls mark religious divide and some divide the rich and the poor, amongst other reasons. These physical walls preach spiritual messages.

A lady from a rich gated community in Brazil was interviewed during the investigation and said of those on the other side of the gate: "They don't come here: we don't go there. We're just neighbours. That's all." So through a simple wall, you can divide two

people who live near to each other and make them total strangers... Doesn't this sound like an ideal tool for the enemy of our souls?

In Belfast, Northern Ireland, there are 99 separate walls dividing working class Protestant and Catholic communities. Some of the walls are as high as 18ft tall.

A resident was interviewed and asked: "Will this wall come down? No, definitely not in my lifetime. I think it will still be up here in this street when I am in my 60s or even 70s. It makes us all feel a bit safer." Now imagine if those words were said by a young Gleaner in the Church...



### "Will these walls that divide us come down? No, definitely not in my lifetime. I think they will still be up when I am in my 60s or even 70s."

Those words now come with great weight. When we build divisive walls, they have an impact on the generation to follow. Our children get used to seeing the walls and they treat those beyond as strangers because of what they have learnt from their example-setters. We are to be so careful what we say, and how we talk in front of our children. They are sponges and should not be party to their example-setters speaking ill of Brother or Sister So-and-So. A child will adopt your beef and hold on to it long after you have moved on. And in so doing, another foot will be added to the divisive walls. Nobody in Belfast has to teach the children how to feel about the people on the other side – they see the wall, see how those over them behave and learn accordingly.

How damaging this is in a spiritual sense, in a church setting! What a difference it would make for the children of the Church to see her operating in its fullness with her members moving, speaking, thinking as one - loving one another with the love of the Lord, seeking His will, demolishing the walls and knocking out the enemy!

How wonderful it is when they hear us praying in earnest for our brothers and sisters beyond our family, beyond our local churches, beyond our country, and the other sheep beyond the Church who Christ is soon to bring in! These prayers and these movements will help to bring UNITY.

This is the Korean DMZ - a demilitarized Zone which splits North and South Korea.



North and South Korea are in great conflict with each other and there is a 155 mile wide zone separating the two. Talk about keeping each other at arm's length! That's another message in itself. North and South Korea are the SAME country and yet they keep each other at arm's length. Anyone who tries to cross the DMZ would most likely be arrested, or at worst, shot. It is interesting that walls are often a place of great conflict and a site of death. Those who have tried to cross the walls, dig beneath them or challenge their existence have been killed and seen as a threat.

You often find that those who try to cross divides, those who seek peace, restoration and reconciliation can be seen as suspect and an enemy to


anyone who wishes to keep the wall up! But if you want UNITY it is worth the risk! Jesus prayed that we would be one (St. John 17:21), and so it is not His will that the walls of division are there in the first place.

Another quote from the article in the Guardian mentioned earlier is so true: "In the short term, walls may appear worthwhile investments, but they never address the underlying causes of the conflicts they seek to mitigate. At best, walls create an illusion of security..."

This is also applicable in a spiritual sense. The walls that divide God's people do nothing to address the reason for the divide. And some of us have become so used to the walls of division that we accept them, work around them and 'get on with things' even though those walls are a hindrance to God's programme and the Church's purpose here on earth!

Right now, the kingdom of God looks something like this:

There are miles and miles of wall throughout the kingdom of God because there are thousands of denominations. It was never in the will of God that there would be so many Christians with such different beliefs. And surely this can look confusing to the non-Christian.



name a few. Walls have been built that should not have been - rather than working out differences, we build separation barriers. BUT!! Be encouraged!! Every wall built to divide us will have to come down for perfection to take place. The walls that we see shall not remain forevermore. Christ prayed that we shall all be ONE, and ONE we shall be. I believe that with all my heart.

The question is though, at that time, "Will you be among the Bride or will you not?" Let us strive to be ONE with GOD - to walk in perfect step with Him. Unity will be inevitable when we do this.

The walls we should build, and keep up, are the ones that protect us as a body from the enemy. Like Jerusalem in the Bible, these are the walls that surround the **whole** city, enclosing us all! We build these walls through prayer - walking in the light and maintaining the favour of God.

But we have failed to discern the enemy's tactics. We tear down the walls that protect us...and build walls around ourselves, our groups, those who believe the same as us and think the same as us. So Satan has free reign amongst us, while we think we are protecting ourselves and our friends.

We now need to unite together to build the walls to keep the enemy out and to break down the walls that divide us.

### **Beliefs and Opinions**

God has a perfect will in every area. It is for us to seek it out, and to work out our differences in the fear of God and in love. There are no private interpretations (2 Peter 1:20). God will make His will known to one and all. But what happens in the meantime? Do we keep malice with those who do not agree with us?

Or do we search the Scriptures, reason and pray together to find the perfect will of God? Do we, alongside prayer, use the mechanisms within the Church to help settle our questions, do we seek godly counsel, or do we get our tools out and start building a wall which we remain behind? Generally, once a wall is up, groups will form on either side.

1 Corinthians 3:3: "For ye are yet carnal: for whereas there is among you envying, and strife, and divisions, <u>are ye not</u> carnal, and walk as men?"

1 Corinthians 1:10: "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be <u>no</u> divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

The enemy wants nothing more than to divide us. Why? Walls will block our evangelism - Jesus prayed that we may all be one so that the world would see that the Father had sent Him! Walls will also block our much needed revival! But one day, every wall of division that exists in the Church will be blown down before she makes her final voyage home.

**GOD** is the Chief Architect! Abraham looked for a city whose Builder and Maker is GOD!! We have no place putting up walls where they should not be. If the Ark was built with extra walls within it, surplus to God's will, it would have sank in that flood.

### Groups

It is not the will of God that there be separate groups within His Church.

Let's look at the Gentiles and Jews. The gospel was first preached to the Jews and the first Christians were Jews. They maintained much of the Mosaic law, continuing in ordinances like circumcision and maintaining the dietary laws. The Jews stayed very separate from the Gentiles and did not fellowship with them. But there came a time when God revealed to Peter that it was time to take the gospel to the Gentiles. God told him *"What God hath cleansed, that call not thou common."* (Acts 10:15)

Peter demonstrated that he understood this: Acts 10:34-35: "Then Peter opened his mouth, and said, Of a truth I perceive that <u>God is no respecter of persons</u>: But in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him."

Ephesians 2:14: "For he is our peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us;"

Ephesians 2:18: "For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father."

God did not want separate groupings within the Church. The divide was reconciled through the cross. The same is to be said of now. We are on the same side.

### Paul preaches in Colossians 3:11: "Where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free: but Christ is all, and in all."

However, there came a time where Peter (who was saved, sanctified and filled with the Holy Ghost, but still fallible) had to be rebuked to his face by Paul. Peter had believed God's plan for the Gentiles and had started fellowshipping with them - but, there was an occasion when some staunch Jews from Jerusalem came to visit him at Antioch.

Galatians 2:11-14: "But when Peter was come to Antioch, I withstood him to the face, because he was to be blamed. For before that certain came from James, he did eat with the Gentiles: but when they were come, he withdrew and separated himself, fearing them which were of the circumcision. And the other Jews dissembled likewise with him; insomuch that Barnabas also was carried away with their dissimulation. But when I saw that they walked not uprightly according to the truth of the gospel, I said unto Peter before them all, If thou, being a Jew, livest after the manner of Gentiles, and not as do the Jews, why compellest thou the Gentiles to live as do the Jews?"

A split was caused in the Church as the walls between the Jews and Gentiles were going back up again. Peter did not want to be seen to be fellowshipping with the Gentiles in front of this group of Jews and Paul had to call out the hypocrisy in front of all. Peter 'withdrew and separated himself' as he had clearly been intimidated by those 'of the circumcision'. GOD FORBID that any of us withdraw or separate ourselves from our fellow brethren due to any such intimidation! In fact, the Bible tells us to mark and avoid those who **cause** divisions contrary to the doctrine we have learned (Romans 16:17) - and even this, we do in love - in a spirit of restoration.

**Do not be intimidated into maintaining division**. Division is against the will of God, yet there are people who are happy to build and maintain walls around the place.

We do not want groups and cliques within the Church - they do nothing to strengthen our unity. In fact, they work directly against it. The Spirit of God will not flow freely - moving in this group, jumping over the wall and then moving in that group. Also, we are deceived if we only feel the presence of God when our group is present. When we are filled with the Holy Ghost, He dwells within us - that means, we carry Him with us. If He is moving, and you have Him, you will feel Him no matter who is around. It is the power of the Holy Ghost that is going to do the work among us if we get out of the way and let Him.

When you are behind the wall, because you cannot see over it, and because the people on the other side are strangers, it can result in distrust, suspicion and even fear of them. Ask yourself today, how do you feel about those on the other side of the walls that divide us? When is the last time you prayed for them or made any attempt towards pulling the wall down?

I remember being in secondary school and having a desire to be liked by everybody. I was friends with the bad girls, I was friends with those that others might consider a little different, and I was teacher's pet at the same time. I tried hard to please them all every day. This was a very tiring exercise. You will find that if you try and please all the people, you will get very tired indeed. That is not how biblical unity will come - pleasing all the people. You will get exhausted and lost this way. I have learnt a valuable lesson in this life; not everyone will like you. And that's ok. So then, why not just work hard to please the Lord? God does not expect us to run around sweating, trying to please everyone. He only wants us to please HIM. Glory to God. And in so doing - when we all work hard on this wise, we will naturally become unified one with another.

Back to school - and this is true of today. You will often find there's a crew. There are those who want to be in the crew so bad that they are willing to even compromise who they are in order to get in, dying to impress the crew members. Once in, they lose their identity. What the crew likes, they like. What the crew dislikes, they dislike. Who the crew withdraws from, they withdraw from. When they are with the crew, they change until soon, the person bears no resemblance of their former selves - LOST.

Church should have NO CREWS!! So if you are not 'in the crew' rejoice! If you are not in the clique rejoice! You are exactly where you are supposed to be! In fact, we should all be members of God's crew! What He likes, we should like, what He dislikes, we should dislike, what He separates Himself from, we should separate ourselves from. We trade our nature for HIS nature. Now that is a good trade! I do not mind losing Claudine and who she is, and exchanging her for the divine nature! That is the only crew I wish to be a part of.

### The Early Church Example

Acts 2:44-47: "And all that believed were together, and had all things common; And sold their possessions and goods, and parted them to all men, as every man had need. And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart, Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

It is worth noting that God considered it safe to add His precious people to the Church, once there was unity. Daily you know. Praise the Lord for those that God is adding to the flock today - I believe that there are so many more to come, once the Lord considers it safe to do so.

Unity is not only the responsibility of the leadership. It is the responsibility of us all. It is so easy to blame someone else. As we all strive to be more like Christ, we can encourage one another; we can reach out to one another; many of us have access to a phone, some of us have our own transport and we can all pray for one another. The early Church continued daily with one accord.

We are in local churches for organisational purposes. Here in England, we currently have four churches. It does not mean that I speak 'Long Lane-ese' because I worship at Long Lane, or that my fellow brethren speak 'Handsworthese', Druids Heathese or Londonese!!! We are all ONE and should speak the same language. Any attitude that exhibits "I stick to my own" is going to be at odds with God's unified plan for His worldwide Church.

The Church is blessed with National and International events all throughout the year - go! They are not for someone else - they are for you too! National Minsters' Convention, National Youth Convention, National Convention, National Family Camp, National Men's Retreat, National Ladies' Retreat, National WMB Fasting, National VLB events, BTI, the General Assembly...the list goes on. And we do not attend just so that "someone can see that I was there" - let us attend to build and strengthen one another. Attendance at these gatherings strengthens our unity. Yes they cost - but make the sacrifice. The money will come - if we have a heart that says "Lord I want to get to know my brethren, to fellowship with them, for us to edify one another, to bring You glory and for unity to be strengthened." Do we think the Lord will ignore that prayer? In fact it is when you attend that you will often hear the testimonies of how God has provided the money!

It is also amazing how God will stretch the remainder when we give towards His programme. We preach about faith from the pulpit and then forget how to apply it when it comes to ourselves. Jesus took notice of the poor widow who threw two mites into the treasury (St. Mark 12:42) - her offering was considered more than the rich who cast in much because she gave all she had.

### An Individual Challenge

I cannot share this message without testifying as the message challenged me first and caused me to face a few things. Since my youth, I have had an inner mentality that, 'If you hurt me, or offend me, I am going to immediately construct a wall so that you never do that to me again'. Behind such walls there is safety and protection - or so I thought. It is possible to be living for God - and to be wrong in your approach. God had to show me through this message that this is the **wrong** approach as a child of God. It is very hard to truly love through a wall. Plus, God is to be my protection and my defence:

Psalm 7:10: "My defence is of God, which saveth the upright in heart." Psalm 59:9: "Because of his strength will I wait upon thee: for God is my defence." Psalm 62:2: "He only is my rock and my salvation; he is my defence; I shall not be greatly moved."

Nowhere in the Bible am I instructed to build a wall of protection around myself from anyone. Nowhere am I told to stand behind walls that I have built in order to keep me safe. The song writer said "Jesus, be a fence, all around me every day. Lord I want you to protect me as I travel along the way. Lord I know you can, Lord I know you WILL, fight my battles if I just keep still. Be a fence all around me every day." When Jesus builds the fence, we can still love through it. We can still have compassion through it... So when we build walls and resolve "I ain't saying anything..." we have the whole thing back to front.

### It's Demolition Time!

As one fold, let us unite against the walls that divide us. There was a wall that stood in the way between the children of Israel and the first city of the Promised Land - the wall of Jericho. They ALL had their part to play in it coming down. Men of war had to march and the people had to shout when instructed. Sure enough, the wall came down and the children of Israel were able to take the city. We need to demolish the walls in the face of Satan. We have work to do.

I refer again to Jesus' prayer that we may all be one. Imagine what we will be able to accomplish when unity is in perfect operation. In Ephesians 2:19 Paul describes us as being "of the household of God". To live in one house with family, and to never come out of your bedroom would cause tension.

Some parents do not like it when their child closes their bedroom door on themselves for hours on end - it's divisive and can make for an uncomfortable environment. When behind the door, they can be heard talking and laughing with their friends, but then when they come down to the living room for dinner, they are vexed and moody, anxious to get back upstairs. Does this sound familiar? Can this not also happen in the Church household?

In the literal household, we live close and sometimes we fall out but for peace sake, and because of love, we reconcile one with another. In some families, grudges are held that last for years and years, all the way to the grave, making the funeral a very awkward affair. Let this not be so in The Church of God.

Paul encourages us in Ephesians 4:31-32: "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

Finally, a quote from the BTI correspondence course puts things into perspective:

"UNITY and PERFECTION are both cardinal doctrines of the Bible... The Church of God holds them forth as STANDARDS and GOALS to be reached. Unity and perfection are dependent one upon the other. **Bible perfection cannot be attained without unity**..."

So what can **we** do to bring unity in our local church, the Church nationally or internationally? At the very least we can pray like Jesus did - that we all may be ONE. Let's start today.
